Introduction

Species Selection

The City has meticulously chosen its preferred tree species based on their ability to thrive in the specific local soils and environmental conditions. It is essential to strike a balance between native and exotic trees to establish a sustainable urban canopy that can effectively withstand the challenging conditions present in the streetscape environment.

The trees will support biodiversity and include species that will benefit a variety of fauna, including birds, reptiles, and insects.

The City will have evaluated site conditions, such as soil quality, exposure, weather conditions (including orientation), infrastructure, and services, to identify the most suitable tree species for each location. By carefully selecting the appropriate tree species, the City aims to promote the healthy and successful growth of its Urban Forest, ensuring its longevity.

The inclusion of species in the planting palette will have a significant impact on adapting to changing environmental conditions. By incorporating more drought-tolerant species and experimenting with other varieties, these species will play a crucial role. Moreover, specific species have been carefully selected for their suitability under powerlines, not under powerlines and as well as for areas such as parks and road medians. These selections have been made based on recommendations from nurseries that locally grow and source these species.

**We collaborate with the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) to oversee the Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) and myrtle rust in Western Australia. Given the emergence of PSHB in the Perth metropolitan area and the potential spread of Myrtle rust (caused by the fungus Austropuccinia psidii), certain species may be excluded from the selection pallet based on updated information provided by DPIRD.

Placement of trees on your verge

Due to the presence of underground services, all trees planted on verges need to be planted 2.7 metres from your boundary line towards the road. When trees are located on the front verge, they will be positioned between the driveway and side boundary at equal distance.

When trees are to be planted on a side verge, they will be spaced evenly in the available space.

Consideration will be given to various pieces of infrastructure on the verge to ensure adequate space is maintained, such as reticulation, power poles, manhole covers and hydrants.

How you can help

Residents' extra attention is highly valued and will significantly contribute to the survival and flourishing of the trees.

To contribute, you have the option to:

- Offer supplementary water to trees during the summer season.
- Ensure that grass is kept away from the base of young trees.
- Take care not to harm trees while moving lawns.
- Notify the City about any damaged trees, enabling them to arrange for replacements.
- Refrain from parking vehicles in close proximity to trees.

Angophora costata	Sydney Red Gum	This evergreen tree is of medium size and has a dome-shaped weeping habit. It develops a fibrous trunk with low branches that may appear somewhat out-of-proportion. The species has distinctive smooth bark that is pinkish or orange-brown when new and fades to grey with age. The tree produces white flowers that bear a resemblance to those of the tea-tree. Banksia ilicifolia	Holly-Leaved Banksia	Banksia ilicifolia is a more primitive variety closely related to dryandras. It features unique flowers arranged in a dome shape, unlike the typical cylindrical shape found in most Banksias. Referred to as the holly-leaved Banksia, it is characterized by its dark green serrated leaves resembling holly. Thriving in full sun and well-draining soil, this tree, like other Banksias, attract birds and insects with its pink and cream flowers blooming mainly in Spring. Banksia integrifolia	Coastal Banksia	The flowers of this captivating tree consist of dense, fuzzy spikes or clusters of tightly packed small flowers. Corymbia eximia nana	Dwarf Yellow Bloodwood	Small variety of the Yellow Bloodwood tree exhibits a compact and rounded growth habit with a slightly open canopy. This makes it an excellent choice for creating a charming under-story garden filled with shade-loving plants. The large clusters of creamy-white flowers provide a beautiful contrast against the mature foliage, which ranges from light green to bluish green. Additionally, the bark on the gnarly trunk adds to its appeal, with its rough and tessellated yellowish-brown to grey texture. Corymbia eximia nana attracts native birds and bees. Corymbia ficifolia	W.A Red Flowering Gum	Tree is a small to medium ornamental Australian Native tree known for its stunning floral exhibition in the summer season. The flower colours vary, spanning from deep red to pink and vibrant orange. The foliage is glossy and leathery with a grey-green hue. This tree serves well as a shade or windbreak. The tree features long, leathery green leaves and eye-catching large yellow flowers, which eventually develop into woody capsules with a frosty silver appearance. The trunk of the tree is smooth and has a whitish grey colour. It is an excellent choice for providing shade, as it is resistant to both frost and drought. Eucalyptus kochii	Trayning Mallee	This mallee tree native to Western Australia is of moderate size. It shows great adaptability to various growing conditions, as it is drought tolerant, thrives in full sun, and can establish itself in different soil types, such as sand. The bark is rough on the smaller branches and firm on the majority of the stems. Its fruit features a rounded operculum, along with glossy adult leaves. Its semi-evergreen foliage resembles attractive fern-like leaves. Jacaranda mimosifolia is perfect as a focal point in avenue or street plantings, but its moderate size also makes it suitable for suburban gardens as a striking specimen or feature tree. It thrives in a sunny to partly shaded location with well-draining, moist soil. Melaleuca linariifolia	Snow in Summer	Commonly known as snow-in-summer, is recognized for its stunning white and cream flowers that nearly blanket the foliage during the spring and early summer. Pyrus ussuriensis	Manchurian Pear	Commonly referred to as the Manchurian Pear, is a well-liked deciduous tree of medium size that displays stunning autumn colours. It is distinguished by its wider spread compared to other varieties and its early spring blossoming of creamy white flowers. This tree is perfect for offering shade or as a focal point in urban plantings, parks, or expansive residential gardens. It creates a striking visual impact when planted along narrow streets or avenues. Optimal growth conditions include full sun exposure and well-drained soil. Sapium sebiferum	Chinese Tallow	This medium-sized tree is quite appealing. With heart-shaped green leaves that turn from yellow to bright red - purple in the autumn, it makes for a beautiful addition to any park or garden. Acacia acuminata	Jam Wattle	This resilient species is known for its ability to withstand drought, frost, salt, and lime. It thrives in various soil types and produces beautiful golden yellow flowers that resemble rod shapes. The flowers bloom profusely and release a pleasant fragrance similar to raspberry jam when cut. This tre grows quickly and is beneficial for providing shelter, controlling erosion. The timber is tough, heavy, long-lasting, and resistant to white ant damage. Callistemon viminalis prolific	Bottlebrush	Attract nectar-loving birds to your garden with the eye-catching small tree. The tree produces flower buds in groups of seven, with white or cream flowers appearing from early winter to late summer, and hemispherical fruit. Magnolia little gem	Teddy Bear	The dwarf variety of the evergreen magnolia (Magnolia grandiflora) is only a quarter of its size. Magnolias are known for their stunning flower displays, and the Little Gem is no exception. With dark green glossy leaves and brown velvety undersides, this tree produces full-sized creamy-white, fragrant flowers that stand out against the dark foliage. Little Gem is perfect for those with limited space, as it offers the advantage of full-sized blooms from a smaller sized tree. Plant Magnolia Little Gem in an area of full sun to part shade, with well-drained soil. Once established, it is a hardy and versatile tree that will tolerate a range of conditions and is relatively disease and pest free.
