# COVID-19 RECOVERY IN THE CITY OF BAYSWATER

The effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have been felt worldwide, and the City of Bayswater has not been immune. The City's economic, infrastructure and community recovery plans aim to lessen the impacts of COVID-19 in the community by supporting individuals, businesses and groups. With these plans, we are protecting those who call the City home, boosting our local economy and ensuring the vibrancy of our local areas by improving our facilities.

## How did we respond?

- · Closed and reopened our facilities in line with public health advice.
- Acted guickly to provide more services and events online.
- · Ran a successful redeployment program for City employees.
- Kept in touch with more than 800 vulnerable community members.
- Implemented a \$0 rate increase for 2020/21.
- · Created a Financial Hardship Policy.
- · Developed the 'Buy in Baysie' program to support local businesses.
- · Suspended recreation memberships free of charge.
- · Waived or temporarily reduced a number of fees and charges.
- · Increased cleaning regimes.
- Left lights on for longer in parks to increase community safety and promoted healthy, active lifestyles.



## Ongoing local impacts we are aiming to address

- Unemployment and underemployment, especially for youth and the culture and arts community.
- Mental health and social isolation issues.
- · Financial hardship for individuals and organisations.
- Increased demand for support services.
- Focus on spending locally.
- Temporary closures of sporting and recreational clubs and facilities; and cancellation of services, events and initiatives.
- Increases in recreational and social activity in parks, reserves and on pathways.
- · Heightened requirements for preventative health and hygiene measures
- The consequences of poor eating habits developed during restriction periods.
- Increases in family and domestic violence and elder abuse.
- Fast-tracked federal, state and local works to boost the economy.
- Prioritisation of METRONET construction program and associated works.
- Decreased business and consumer confidence.
