Item 10.3.2 Community Sport are		This report does not address whether the concept of a Child Safety Officer is a good idea or not. The Royal Commission has already decided Child Safety Officers would be a good idea. The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries is currently consulting to ask if the City currently provides any of the services and what the impacts would be on the City when the City is asked to provide these services. The concept of the Child Safety Officer responsibilities is a positive one along with other recommendations from the Royal Commission, and is likely to improve child safety. The reason why the report is critical of the approach is that the Discussion Paper fails to address the impact on Local Government and the consultation questions fail to ask this. The State could choose carry out the functions of a Child Safety Officer through the Department of Communities, mitigating any impact on Local Government, or the State could choose to provide financial support to Local Governments to assist with funding this new additional responsibility; neither opportunity appears to have been considered by the Department.
